




Population change by metro/nonmetro status, 1976-2013


Educational attainment for adults 25 and older, 2000 and 2013


Real median household income by residence, 2000-12 (in 2012 dollars)




U.S. employment, metro and nonmetro areas, 2007-2016 (quarterly)





Nonmetro county poverty rates, 2010-14 average








Poverty rates for children under 18 by county, 2009-13


Distribution of nonmetro and metro employment by industry group, 2014



Note: Employment is full-time and part-time jobs, by place of work.




Producer services play a larger role in the labor market in urban areas, 2014





Rural counties vary in their economic structure with marked regional differences














Median farm operator household income compared with median U.S. household income, 1991-2015


Real median household income by residence, 2000-12 (in 2012 dollars)

Median operator household income by farm type, 2015




Household income is not estimated for nonfamily farms.


PAYMENT PER RECIPIENT
